4. Serve as the first phase of a comprehensive State effort to improve the coordination of planning, development, public health impact assessment, environmental justice, and sustainability.
5. To identify the information needs, tools, and legal/regulatory changes that would help to incorporate these considerations into the planning and facility permitting process.
