REPORT OF THE MARYLAND BUREAU OF MINES 1939

To His Excellency,

HON. HERBERT R. O'CONOR,

Governor of Maryland.

SIR:

The report herewith submitted is for the calendar year 1939, and is the sixty-third annual report upon conditions of the Coal and Clay mines within the State.

The reports from the various mining operators throughout the State show the tonnage to be as follows:

CLAY AND COAL PRODUCTION

COAL PRODUCTION, ALLEGANY COUNTY

During the calendar year 1939 Allegany County employed 1,241 miners, 110 drivers, 185 inside laborers and 124 outside employees making a total of 1,660 men. The production of coal for the year 1939 was 860,469.07 net tons. This shows a production of 693.3 net tons for each miner employed during this period.

COAL PRODUCTION, GARRETT COUNTY

During the calendar year 1939 Garrett County employed 848 miners, 118 drivers, 112 inside laborers, and 126 outside employees making a total of 1,204 employees. The production of coal for the year 1939 was 607,381.10 net tons. This shows a production of 716.2 net tons for each miner employed during this period.

FIRE CLAY PRODUCTION

During the calendar year 1939 the fire clay mines in Allegany County employed 86 miners, 7 drivers, 11 inside laborers and 24 outside employees, making a total of 120 men. The production of fire clay during the calendar year 1939 was 69,220.17 net tons.

TONNAGE PER FATALITY (BY COUNTY)

In Allegany County for the calendar year 1939 there were 860,469 net tons of coal produced for each fatal accident; number of fatalities per 1,000 employes .602; number of fatalities per 1,000,000 tons of coal produced 1.162.

There were no fatalities in the coal mines of Garrett County during 1939.

TONNAGE PER FATALITY FOR ENTIRE YEAR

During the calendar year 1939 there were 1,467,850 net tons of coal produced for each fatal accident; fatalities per 1,000 employes .349; number of fatalities per 1,000,000 tons of coal produced .681.

WEIGHMASTER LICENSES FOR THOSE WEIGHING SOLID FUEL

During the year 1939, in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 349 Maryland Laws (1937) the Bureau continued to inspect the weigh scales of all those engaged in weighing solid fuel in the State of Maryland, outside the City of Baltimore, 229 truck scales being tested and 15 were re-tested.

From the inception of the work under this Law, November 23, 1937, up to and including December, 1939, 1,010 weighmaster licenses were issued by the Bureau, the fee for each license being \$10.00, and this money was turned over to the State Treasurer.

From January, 1939, to December, 1939, inclusive, 383 weighmaster licenses were issued.

BALTIMORE'S EXPORT COAL BUSINESS IN 1939

Through the courtesy of the Export and Import Bureau, Baltimore Association of Commerce, we are able to give the following information:

Coal exports from the Port of Baltimore during the calendar year 1939, amounted to 200,807 long tons, a 393.1 per cent increase over 1938, and a gain of 235.3 per cent compared with 1937. The 1939 exports were carried on 37 vessels, while 14 vessels carried 40,727 tons in 1938 and the same number of ships handled the 59,888 tons exported during 1937.

Argentina was the leading customer for coal from Baltimore during the year, taking 113,343 tons on 19 vessels. Italy was second with 21,926 tons on 3 vessels, and Brazil was third with 15,480 tons on 3 vessels. Norway was in fourth place with 13,192 tons on 2 ships. Cuba, dropping from first place in 1938 to fifth in 1939, took 11,853 tons, carried on 4 ships. The remaining 25,013 tons were exported to

Denmark, Martinique, the Philippine Islands, St. Pierre de Miquelon and Sweden.

During the first four months of 1940, 67,118 tons of coal have been exported on 11 vessels.

Bunker coal supplied to vessels operating in the foreign trade from the Port of Baltimore during 1939 amounted to 117,106 long tons. This compared with 97,849 tons in 1938, and 133,103 tons during 1937.

LABOR CONDITIONS

There was a cessation of mining operations in the Union mines from April 1st to May 15th, 1939, and this was occasioned by the prolongation of negotiations between operators and miners in New York City. It was not until the end of this period that an agreement was arrived at and mining operations resumed. During this time open-shop mines, especially in Garrett County, operated. One of them was picketed and some disorder occurred but the State Police and Sheriff were on the ground at all times and no serious trouble resulted.

Other than this there were no labor troubles during the year in the coal mines of Western Maryland.

FATAL ACCIDENTS

During the calendar year 1939 one fatal accident occurred in the mines of Allegany and Garrett Counties. A miner lost his life through a fall of roof in a small mine in Allegany County on October 3, 1939.

The Inspectors, operators and miners had hoped that the year 1939 might be a record year in which there would not be a single fatal accident but in this hope they were disappointed. Usually there has been a fatal accident in the month of January of each year and when this did not happen in 1939 the Inspectors began to take heart and increased their vigilance. It was a great disappointment when a fatality occurred in the tenth month of the year.

For a long period of years the average fatal accident record in Maryland coal mines has been three per year. Sixty per cent and over of these have been due to falls of roof and sides.

TRADE CONDITIONS

During the early part of 1939 the larger mines worked almost constantly and continued to work until late in the year. The smaller mines which are usually dependent upon domestic trade for the sale of their product, operated during the winter months but ceased to operate during the spring and summer. On the whole, it was a fairly good year, especially for the larger mines. The increase in production in 1939 over 1938 was approximately 7 per cent.

At the end of 1939 all operators were eagerly awaiting the selling price for coal furnished by the Bituminous Coal Commission, but this hope was not realized during the year.

There was strong competition from oil, hydro-electric plants and natural gas.

PROSECUTIONS

On complaint of a District Mine Inspector a mine foreman was tried for (1) allowing an unauthorized person to weigh coal at his mine; (2) for failure to visit working places in the mine while men were at work; (3) for failure to enter and sign mine report book; and (4) failure to make production reports to the Mine Inspector when required.

The defendant was found guilty on the first charge and fined \$25.00 and costs. The fine was suspended on payment of costs. On charge (4) the defendant was found guilty and fined \$25.00 and costs. The fine was suspended upon payment of costs \$2.45. The other charges were not pressed.

**COAL TRANSPORTED BY THE RAILROADS TRAVERSING

The coal shipments over the Cumberland & Pennsylvania Railroad, which traverses the center of the George's Creek coal field, amounted to 493,665 net tons.

There were 540,035 net tons of coal produced by mines located on the Western Maryland Railway Company in the State of Maryland during 1939. Of this total, 149,050 net tons originated in the George's Creek District.

For the same period mines located on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad in Maryland made coal shipments amounting to 136,362 net tons.

Was lifting on car with his feet. Did not feel any pain until he started to load car when his side started to hurt him. Injury: Traumatic epidemitis, right side. Caught second right finger between two mining cars while coupling cars, resulting in crushed tip of right second finger. All skin torn from anterior surface of finger.

Caught left hand between post and mining car, and mashed 2nd and 3rd left fingers, resulting in mashed second and third left fingers, and badly crushed 4th left finger. All tissue missing from anterior surface of finger.

Caught 4th left finger between prop and bone in middle of track. Fracture to end of 4th left finger.

Was sharpening machine hits and a piece of steel flew off and struck right thumb. While boring hole foot slipped causing sprained side and back. Sprained abdominal muscles.

Coal fell from face catching man between coal and safety prop, resulting in bruised and sprained right elbow and right arm. Bruised right kidney and right side. Sacroiliac sprain, right side.

Was lifting empty car on track; feet slipped and caused him to sprain his back in the lumbar area.

Slipped while skidding mining machine. Sprained left side.

Pole carrying power line on which machine was working, broke off, causing man to fall to ground. Bruises to right knee and left side of head. Sprained left foot and right hip.

Circuit breaker on switchboard opened unexpectedly causing heavy electric arc close to man's eyes resulting in marked conjunctivitis to both eyes.


