



Lead Paint Accreditation Application Fees

What You Need to Know

Lead Paint Abatement Services Accreditation fees. All accreditation fees are to be mailed with a completed application. There are no on-line services for submitting applications and fees. The fees are as per Code of Maryland 26.16.01.20 and Environmental Article 6-1002.

Accreditation Application Fees

Initial and renewal fees are the same.

Related Fees	Amount
Third Party Exam: Applies to Removal & Demolition Supervisor, Inspector Technician and Risk Assessor who have not held an accreditation in the same category in the past.	\$35.00

Note: The following categories of Lead Paint Abatement Services only require training and do NOT require an application or fee. Trained worker certification must be used under the supervision of an accredited Lead Paint Supervisor:

Training Only Categories
Abatement Worker
Structural Steel Worker
Project Designer



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Submission of Fees

All accreditation fees are to be mailed with a completed application. There are no on-line services for submitting applications and fees. **Fees are non-refundable.**

Exemptions to Fees

The following persons and organizations are exempt from paying a fee with their application are:

- A STATE OR LOCAL GOVERNMENT;
- AN EMPLOYEE OF A STATE OR LOCAL GOVERNMENT
 - providing a lead paint abatement service on behalf of that government;
- A NON-PROFIT TRAINING PROGRAM;
- A SELF-EMPLOYED CONTRACTOR
 - a self-employed contractor is an individual who (1) is not acting as an employee of a firm that employs other individuals, and (2) does not employ other individuals in providing a lead paint abatement service). *Self-employed contractors are **only** exempt from paying for their contractor accreditation. They **must** still pay their supervisor, inspector, or risk assessor fee.*
