**GSA BLADENSBURG
Bladensburg, Maryland**

Site Location

The General Services Administration (GSA) Bladensburg site was located at 4125 46th Street, Bladensburg, Maryland in an industrial park area along Kenilworth Avenue. The area is near the Prince George's marina, which is situated on the Anacostia River. The surrounding areas are characterized by gently rolling hills and light industry.

Site History

The GSA Bladensburg site was used as a temporary storage area for drums that contained mineral oil containing polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs). By November 1979, all of the drums had been transferred from the GSA site to the Curtis Bay facility near Baltimore, Maryland and the GSA Bladensburg site had been cleaned up. The site is federal property, but GSA was held privately responsible.

Environmental Investigations

In March 20, 1989, a *Potential Hazardous Waste Site Final Strategy Determination* was prepared for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) that documented cleanup of the site.

Current Status

On July 1, 1984, the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene's Waste Management Administration published a Master List of all sites where the Department had reason to believe or had been notified that Controlled Hazardous Substances may be present. Subsequent to the publication of this list, the Department conducted further investigation of Department files and performed on-site investigations at a number of these sites. A status update was published in the Maryland Register on January 4, 1985. Based on this review, it was determined by the Administration that No Further Action at this site would be necessary and the site was deleted from the Master List. Since the site was also listed on the EPA's Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Information System, a designation of No Further Remedial Action Planned by EPA would constitute a final decision by both the State and EPA based on the information that was available at the time.
