Maryland's Food Residual **Diversion Law**

During the 2021 legislative session corrections, hotels, grocers, multi-HB264, was passed. The bill requires certain food waste generators that produce 1 ton of food residuals a week and within 30 miles of a composting facility to either reduce, divert to food rescue organizations, farms for animal feed operations, or compost or anaerobically digest the residuals. Food diversion includes sending foods to donation, animal feed and composting.

The Waste Diversion Division is canvasing the state visiting facilities that are potentially mandated to divert under the Food Residual Diversion law. So far we have visited individual schools.

MDE, in conjunction with Towson University, hosted a Food Summit in March 2024 with a session on the Food Residual Diversion Law and with the aim of implementing new food policies in Maryland and overcoming challenges to diverting more food residuals from disposal. Eleven State Agencies Reach 30 Percent Recycling Rate in 2022

State government, as a whole, is required to recycle 30 percent of its waste. In 2022, eleven State agencies recycled at least 30 percent of their waste and six agencies recycled more than 40 percent. State government, as a whole, recycled 23.3 percent of the waste it generated.
