# What is this law and timeline?

- The law referenced throughout this presentation refers to the <u>House Bill 264/Senate Bill 483</u>, passed by the General Assembly in 2021, entitled *Solid Waste Management – Organics Recycling and Waste Diversion – Food Residuals*
- Requires persons that generate food residuals to divert from final disposal in refuse disposal system such as a landfill or incinerator if:
  - 1. The person generates:
  - Beginning January 1, 2023, at least 2 tons food residuals each week
  - Beginning January 1, 2024, at least 1 ton of food residuals each week

### <u>and</u>

2. The person is located within 30 miles of an organics recycling facility with the capacity and willingness to enter into a contract to accept all the person's food residuals for recycling





Under the COMAR codification system, every regulation is assigned unique four-part codification number by which it may be identified.

All regulations are arranged by title. Each title is divided into numbered chapters, and each chapter into numbered regulations.

A regulation may be divided into lettered sections, a section divided into numbered subsections, a subsection divided into lettered paragraphs, and a paragraph divided into numbered subparagraphs.

#### New Food Residuals Diversion Regulations (COMAR 26.04.13)

On December 06, 2022, the Secretary of the Environment adopted new regulations under Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR) 26.04.13 Food Residuals - Organics Recycling and Waste Diversion, The regulations implement House Bill 264/Senate Bill 483 of 2021, and establish certain regulatory conditions for persons required to divert food residuals from final disposal in a refuse disposal system. **The new** regulations become effective on December 26, 2022.

# Regulation 26.04.13.01 - Purpose

### 26.04.13.01

### .01 Purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to establish certain requirements pertaining to the diversion of food residuals from final disposal in a refuse disposal system pursuant to Environment Article, §9-1724.1, Annotated Code of Maryland, including:

A. Clarifying the types of entities and individuals that meet the definition of "person", for the purpose of complying with the food residuals diversion requirements;

B. Clarifying the types of materials that meet the definition of "food residuals";

C. For a person required to divert food residuals from final disposal in a refuse disposal system, establishing:

- (1) The methods for determining the weight of food residuals generated by the person;
- (2) A schedule for complying with the food residuals diversion requirements;
- (3) The documentation to be maintained by a person required to divert food residuals from final disposal in a refuse disposal system; and
- (4) A requirement to submit a certain report annually to counties; and
- D. Establishing application and approval procedures for waivers issued to persons otherwise required to divert food residuals from final disposal in a refuse disposal system.

# **General Provisions**





Subsection 1: Gives MDE the right to inspect any facility that is known or suspected to be subject to these regulations Subsection 2: Details the manner of diverting food residuals such that the residuals are not an environmental nuisance



# Food Residual Diversion Mandate





Subsection 1: Identifies the qualifications that define a "person" under the regulations. Subsection 2: Requires a person to start food diversion within 90 days of meeting the criteria of subsection 1



# What is a "Person" Under the Law?

- As of Jan 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023, at least **2 tons/week** of food residuals, and
- As of Jan 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024, at least **1 ton/week** of food residuals

### <u>AND</u>

- Is located within a **30-mile radius** of an organics recycling facility (e.g. a composter or anaerobic digester) that:
  - Has the capacity to accept and process all of the person's food residuals,
  - Is willing to accept **all** of the person's food residuals for recycling, and
  - Is willing to enter a contract to accept and process the food residuals



# What's a person per the law and regulation?

- A person is a facility that generates food residuals such as a school, supermarket, business cafeteria, etc.
- A person <u>does not</u>include:
  - Aggregate of all school buildings/facilities in a local school system
  - Restaurant that
    - Accommodates the public, and
    - Is equipped with a dining room with facilities for preparing and serving regular meals

# **Determining the Weight of Food Residuals Generated**





### Subsection 1:

Outlines the MDE-approved methods for calculating the weight of food residuals generated Subsection 2: Requires a facility with several buildings that generate food waste on the same campus, and handled by the same waste management, to use a combined food residual weight of all facilities in the weekly weight assessment

### Who is affected by the food residuals diversion law?

- How do you know if this law applies to your facility?
  MDE has prepared a document called "Determination of Applicability of the Food Residuals Diversion Requirement" [ENO / ESP] that describes the entities that may be required to divert their food residuals under the law.
- How to estimate food residuals quantities (sector estimates)?

 MDE has prepared a document called "Maryland Food Readual Generation Factor Estimates by Industry Sector" [ENG / ESP] that explains how ranious industry types can estimate the amount of food residuals they generate.

- What documentation should be maintained at your facility?
  - To maintain compliance with this law, the Department is developing a list of documents required to be maintained on-site for any facility where food residuals are generated.
- Waivers application information
  - If identified as a person under this law, and it is in your belief that compliance would cause an undue hardship, you may request a waiver from the requirements of the law.
  - To apply for a waiver, provide a written explanation, submitted electronically to the Department, demonstrating an undue hardship on the basis of: the cost of diverting food residuals from a refuse disposal system is more than 10% more expensive than the cost of disposing the food residuals at a refuse disposal system; or other reasonable circumstances.

# Waste Assessment Method: Scale Weight



An actual weight measurement of the food residuals after separation from other materials that would be disposed.

A weight estimate determined by the volume of food residuals generated, as measured by the <u>container size</u> filled.



Generation factors have been approved by the Department for use to estimate weekly tonnage of food residuals by industry type. This information can be found in this document:

# **Methods of Diversion**



Subsection 1:

Requires a person under the regulations to separate food residuals from all other waste and noncompostables, including any films or containers



Subsection 2: Identifies the methods a person could use to divert food residuals (Food Recovery Hierarchy)



- Prevention
  - Reduce wasted food
- <u>Rescue</u>
  - Food for people
  - Feed for animals
- <u>Recovery</u>
  - Compost
  - Anaerobic Digestion

# **Documentation**



Subsection 1: Describes the types of documentation a person <u>shall</u> maintain at their facility



Subsection 2: Requires a person to submit the requested documentation not later than 30 days after MDE requests it, unless an alternate deadline is provided by MDE



At a minimum, the facility **<u>shall</u>** maintain, onsite, the following information for each set of waste assessments:

- How weight was calculated
- Breakdown of waste streams, by type, weight and date(s) assessed.
- Facility Name and Address
- Person(s) performing waste assessment
- Summary of food residual totals – tons each week

.04 Waiver from the Food Residuals Diversion Requirement.

Allows for a person required to divert food waste to apply for a waiver from these requirements for a certain period-of-time and for certain reasons



MDE may grant a waiver for the food residual diversion requirements upon demonstration of undue hardship due to:

The cost (hauling and tipping) of diverting food waste is 10% more than the cost of sending the waste to a refuse disposal system

For food residuals identified by federal or state agencies as having biosafety concerns

OR

For other reasonable circumstances as determined by MDE

OR



# Waiver Period

# Waivers **may** be granted for the shorter of the following:



If due to undue hardship, until an alternate organic recycling facility becomes available that is within **30 miles** and willing and able to accept all of a person's food residuals for processing

OR

A period that ends upon the date of a previously approved waiver being revoked.

\*There is no limit to the number of times MDE may grant a person a waiver



The application requirements established under <u>26.04.13.04 – Section D</u> of this regulation do not apply to a waiver requested by, or granted to, a person that generates food residuals identified by a federal or State agency as having a biosecurity or food safety concern.



# **Application Procedures**

A person must submit a written waiver request electronically to MDE, in an approved format, that includes:

A description of the basis for the waiver request.

If based on undue hardship due to diversion costs, include:

**1.** A list of all <u>off-site organic recyclers</u> within 30 miles detailing their costs to accept and process all of the person's the food residuals, and the waste hauler's costs, if from a separate entity, to transport

**2.** A quote or supporting documentationfrom one or more refuse disposalANDsystems detailing their costs to acceptand process all of the person's the foodresiduals, and the waste hauler's costs, iffrom a separate entity, to transport

#### Waiver Application Form - Food Residuals Diversion Law

Beginning January 1, 2023, Maryland law requires certain persons generating food residuals to divert those food residuals from final disposal in a refuse disposal system (i.e., landfill or incinerator). Maryland law also authorizes the Maryland Department of the Environment (the Department) to grant a person a waiver from the food residuals diversion requirement. To apply for a waiver, complete this form and attach supporting documentation as indicated. Learn more about the food residuals diversion law and its requirements by visiting the Department 's website.

#### Waiver Reasons

A person may apply for a waiver for one of the following reasons.

- 1) A person experiences an undue hardship because of the following:
  - a. The cost of diverting food residuals from a refuse disposal system is more than 10 percent more expensive than the cost of disposing the food residuals at a refuse disposal system; or
  - b. For other reasonable circumstances.
- A person generates food residuals identified by a federal or State agency as having a biosecurity or food safety concern.

#### Application Instructions

Before completing this application, review the legal requirements for submitting a waiver request adopted under Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR) 26.04.13.04.

Section 1 – Requestor Information. Identify the organization requesting the waiver. The point of contact shall be an individual familiar with the waiver request, and may be contacted by the Department concerning this application and, if approved, an approved waiver. The authorized representative shall be the owner or operator of the facility where food residuals are generated.

Section 2 - Waste Assessment Methods. Provide documentation regarding the waste assessment method used to determine the weight of food residuals generated each week that includes, at a minimum:

- 1) A description of waste assessment and/or weight measurement methods utilized;
- 2) Copy of calculations, measurements, or statistics utilized in calculating food residuals tonnages;
- 3) The name and title of the individual(s) performing waste assessment and/or weight measurements;
- 4) A summary of food residuals tonnages generated each week; and
- 5) The dates the waste assessment and/or weight measurements occurred.

Section 3 - Reason for Requesting a Waiver. Provide a written explanation that describes the reason for the waiver request and attached any supporting documentation, including:

- If the waiver request is based on the cost of diverting food residuals being more than 10 percent more expensive than the cost of disposing the food residuals, submit the following information:
  - a. A list of all off-site organics recycling facilities located within a 30-mile radius of the property; and b. Quotes or other supporting documentation detailing the cost to accept, haal, and process your organization's food residuals provided each off-site organics recycling facilities, one or more refuse disposal systems, and one or more food waste hauters.
- If the waiver is based on a biosecurity or food safety concern, attach the notification from the federal or State agency.
- If the waiver is based on other reasonable circumstances, attached any relevant supporting documentation such as written correspondences, business records, financial statements, etc.

Section 4 – Certification and Signature. Certify by signing the form that the information provided on this form is true and correct to the knowledge of the individual signing the form. The form shall be signed by the authorized representative identified under section 1.

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# **Reapplication for a Waiver**

# A person granted a waiver **<u>shall</u>** reapply for a waiver

At least **60** days before the expiration of a previous waiver or whenever an alternate organics recycling facility becomes available, whichever occurs first If the waiver request is based on undue hardship due to diversion costs, a person <u>shall</u> include all required documentation to support a hardship request. Documentation <u>shall</u> have been obtained within 30 days of the reapplication



## Conditions for Approval, Denial, or Revocation of a Waiver

- MDE <u>shall</u> notify the person in writing of a decision to approve or deny a waiver, as well as when a previously approved waiver is revoked
- MDE <u>will</u> notify the person of the term of the waiver period for all approved waiver applications

### MDE may deny a request or revoke a waiver for:

**1.** Violating the provisions of these regulations

**2.** False or inaccurateinformationsubmitted with awaiver request

**3.** Any other goodORcause for denying or<br/>revoking a waiver



- On or before March 1, 2024, and each March 1 thereafter, a person <u>shall</u> submit a report:
  - On the person's solid waste and recyclable materials management activities during the preceding calendar year to each county where the solid waste and recyclable materials were generated; and
  - In a format required by the Department; and
  - That includes all of the following information:
  - 1. The total amount and types, by weight, of recyclable materials generated;
  - 2. The total amount, by weight, of solid waste disposed;
  - 3. The name and location of each refuse disposal system that accepted the solid waste for disposal;
  - 4. The total amount and types, by weight, of recyclable materials diverted from disposal;
  - 5. The name and location of each recycling facility that accepted the recyclable materials for recycling; and
  - 6. Any other information required by the Department.

Response to Comments on the Proposed Action to Adopt New Regulations .01—.05 under COMAR 26.04.13 Food Residuals—Organics Recycling and Waste Diversion

Introduction: On September 23, 2022, the Maryland Department of the Environment ("MDE" or "the Department") proposed to adopt new regulations in order to implement Chapters 439 and 440 of 2021, entitled *Organics Recycling and Waste Division — Food Residuals.*<sup>1</sup> This law requires certain persons who generate, beginning January 1, 2023, certain quantities of food residuals to separate their food residuals from other solid waste, and divert those food residuals from final disposal in a refuse disposal. The public comment period on the proposed action ended on October 24, 2022. Responses to written comments received are provided in this document. On December 06, 2022, after reviewing the public comments, the Secretary of the Environment adopted the regulations as proposed with nonsubstantive changes. The Notice of Final Action was published in the December 16, 2022 issue of the *Maryland Register* and the regulations become effective on December 26, 2022.

<u>Comments</u>: MDE received written comments on the proposed action from a total of 15 entities and individuals. The topics of the comments received and the name and affiliation of the commenter, as well as MDE's responses, are given below, with comments regarding related topics addressed with a single response. The whole text of each comment is included in Appendix A of this document. A copy of the published Notice of Proposed Action is included in Appendix B and an accompanying compliance guide for the proposed regulations is included in Appendix C.<sup>2</sup>

#### 1. Comment Topic: Definitions - "Anacrobic Digestion"

Commenter(s) Name and Affiliation: Alan Pultyniewicz, Montgomery County Department of Environmental Protection (DEP)

**MDE Response:** Montgomery County DEP commented "[the] term 'anaerobic' should be further defined, rather than simply stating the word 'anaerobic' again within the definition of 'anaerobic digestion'" and that "[the] term 'anaerobic' should be defined/explained in guidance, outreach and education provided by MDE".<sup>3</sup> The proposed definition of 'anaerobic digestion' found in COMAR 26.04.13.02B(1) is established in statute under §9-1701(b) of the Environment Article. <sup>4</sup> This section of the Maryland law defines terms that are applicable to the food residuals diversion requirements in §9-1724.1 of the Environment Article.
