## REPORT OF THE MARYLAND BUREAU OF MINES

*To His Excellency,*

HON. ALBERT C. RITCHIE,

*Governor of Maryland:*

Sir:

The report herewith submitted is for the period May 1st to December 31st, 1922, which was the fourth annual report of the then State Mine Inspector, Frank T. Powers, and the Forty-Seventh Annual Report upon Conditions of the Coal and Clay Mines within the State. This report also includes the report of conditions of the Coal and Clay Mines within the State for the calendar year 1923, in accordance with the new Mining Law, which requires that the report be made for the calendar year instead of the fiscal year as heretofore.

The reports from the various mining operations throughout the State show the tonnage to be as follows:

### CLAY AND COAL PRODUCTION.

### COAL PRODUCTION, ALLEGANY COUNTY.

During the period from May 1, 1922, to December 31, 1922, Allegany County employed 1,278 miners, 129 drivers, 287 inside laborers and 264 outside laborers, making a total of 1,958 men. The production of coal for Allegany County for the period May 1st to December 31st, 1922, was 409,212 tons. This shows a production of 320.5 tons for each miner employed during this period.

During the period from January 1st, 1923, to December 31st, 1923, Allegany County employed 1,640 miners, 170 drivers, 368 inside laborers and 346 outside laborers, making a total of 2,524 men. The production of coal for Allegany County for the period January 1st to December 31st, 1923, was 1,536,358.97 tons. This shows a production of 936.80 tons for each miner employed during this period.

### COAL PRODUCTION, GARRETT COUNTY

During the period from May 1st to December 31st, 1922, Garrett County employed 766 miners, 102 drivers, 141 inside laborers and 185 outside laborers, making a total of 1,194 men. The production of coal for Garrett County for the period May 1st to December 31st, 1922, was 340,112 tons. This shows a production of 444.01 tons for each miner employed during the period from May 1st to December 31st, 1922.

During the period from January 1st to December 31st, 1923, Garrett County employed 856 miners, 106 drivers, 158 inside laborers, and 191 outside laborers, making a total of 1,311 men. The production of coal for Garrett County for the period January 1st to December 31st, 1923, was 763,071.77 tons. It also shows a production of 891.43 tons for each miner employed.

### FIRE CLAY PRODUCTION.

During the period from May 1st to December 31st, 1922, the Fire Clay Mines in Allegany County employed 46 miners, 9 drivers, 20 inside laborers and 14 outside laborers, making a total of 89 men. The production of clay for Allegany County for the period May 1st to December 31st, 1922, was 38,162 tons. It also shows a production of 829.6 tons of clay for each miner employed.

During the period from January 1st to December 31st, 1923, the Clay Mines in Allegany County employed 58 miners, 10 drivers, 28 inside laborers and 27 outside laborers, making a total of 1,051 men. The production of clay for Allegany County for the period from January 1st to December 31st, 1923, was 56,578.68 tons. It also shows a production of 975.66 tons of clay for each miner employed.

### TONNAGE PER FATALITY.

In Allegany County for the period May 1st to December 31st, 1922, there were 204,813 tons of coal produced for each fatal accident, while in Garrett County for the same period there were 340,112 tons of coal for each fatal accident.

In Allegany County for the period January 1st to December 31st, 1923, there were 512,119.65 tons of coal produced for each fatal

accident, while in Garrett County for the same period there were 381,535.88 tons of coal produced for each fatal accident.

#### TONNAGE PER FATALITY FOR ENTIRE STATE.

During the period May 1st to December 31st, 1922, there were 249,774 tons of coal produced per fatal accident.

During the period January 1st to December 31st, 1923, there were 459,886 tons of coal produced per fatal accident.

Mr. W. W. Adams, statistician of the U. S. Bureau of Mines, states that the average production per fatality in Bituminous Mines throughout the United States in 1923 was 280,000 tons. It will be noted that compared with the average of the other States, the showing in Maryland mines is commendable.

The new Maryland Mining Law has, during the period covered by this report, operated very efficiently and with little or no friction. The operator and miner members of the Mine Examining Board have given a great deal of time to their duties as members of the Board and have at all times manifested an earnest and broad-minded desire, while acting as members of the Board, to serve the interest of mine safety and efficiency and they have not at any time shown a partisan spirit.

The District Mine Inspectors have manifested a zealous interest in enforcing the laws made to promote mine safety and the conservation of the coal resources of the State.

Notwithstanding the fact that this report covers a period of time during which the entire Western Maryland coal field was harassed by a prolonged strike of coal miners, good mine discipline, which is essential to mine safety, has been maintained at all times. This desirable condition is doubtless due to the fact that the greater number of coal mine employes in the Western Maryland coal field are native-born and English speaking. In this respect, the Western Maryland coal field, especially that portion known as the Georges Creek district, is unique. Probably no other coal field in the United States has such a large percentage of native-born, English-speaking miners.

#### THE NEW MARYLAND MINING LAW

During the Legislative session of 1920, the Allegany and Garrett County delegations in the House offered a bill providing for a revision of the Maryland Mining Law. The bill passed the House, but in the Senate some opposition was met with and an amendment was drafted providing for a commission to draw up a mining code. The Senate adopted this bill and the Governor appointed as a commission, Honorable William M. Maloy, Chairman of the Public Service Commission, representative of the public, as chairman; G. Marshall Gillette, Secretary of the Maryland Coal Operators' Association, and William J. Trickett, Secretary of the miners' organization, as repre-

sentatives of the operators and miners, respectively. The Commission had the valuable assistance of Mr. Charles T. Clayton, Attorney, of Washington, D. C., in the preparation of the law. Mr. Clayton is a former resident of Georges Creek region and was familiar with local conditions.

The Commission drew up a bill, which, when drafted, was submitted to meetings of miners and operators separately, and printed copies of the draft were circulated widely throughout the coal mining regions of the State. A few amendments were proposed and most of these were accepted by the Commission and added to the bill.

The bill, which was known as Senate Bill 55, was introduced by Senator F. W. Mish, of Washington County, in the Senate, and passed that body without objection. It finally passed the House, after some opposition, and was adopted in its present form and approved by the Governor on April 13, 1922, and became effective October 1, 1922.

This law is peculiar in several respects. In the first place, it simplifies the examinations for mine foremen and fire bosses in that a very small Mine Examining Board is provided for and this Board has charge of all the examinations for mine foremen and fire bosses within the State.

It is unique, in the second place, in that the law defines gaseous mines in explicit terms, and is believed to be the first state mining law of which this can be said.

Third, it is remarkable for the reason that insofar as is known it is the first attempt in state laws to supplement statute laws with flexible regulations which can meet the changing conditions in coal mines. This bill, at least so far as known, is the first attempt to embody the principle of administrative responsibility with flexible powers to secure objects limited by the statute mining law. Heretofore, mining laws of the various coal producing states have followed the British and Pennsylvania practice which carry rigid provisions on every subject on which the legislature is informed, and there is no means of readily meeting changed conditions without the complete revision of the mining law with all the dangers that attend such revisions.

The metal mines in the State or Wisconsin are operated under regulations promulgated by the Industrial Commission of Wisconsin. This is also the case with the State of Utah, but Maryland is the first State, it is believed, to supplement the Statute Law with regulations. Some twenty-six clauses of the law provide for the preparation and promulgation of regulations. Practically all of the coal producing states have mining laws which are limited to statutes and have no flexibility and this has tended to hamper the efforts of the mine inspectors in their endeavors to remedy conditions which tend to cause mine accidents and disasters.

The division of responsibility at the working face between the miner and the foreman in the Maryland Mining Law is almost ideal in that it places the responsibility for the safety of the miner equally upon the foreman and the miner himself.

Heretofore the annual reports of the Maryland State Mining Inspectors have covered the year May 1 to April 30. This report covers the period from May 1, 1922 to December 31, 1922, and from January 1, 1923, to December 31, 1923.

The new Maryland Mining Law, creating the Maryland Bureau of Mines a separate bureau in the State Board of Labor and Statistics, was approved April 13th, 1922, and became effective October 1, 1922. Previous to the enactment of this law, the State Mining Inspector was an employe of the State Board of Labor and Statistics. Frank T. Powers was acting as State Mining Inspector when the new mining law became effective, October 1, 1922, and was continued under a temporary appointment as District Mine Inspector until a State Mine Examining Board could be appointed and examinations for Mine Foremen, Fire Bosses and District Mine Inspectors held.

John J. Rutledge was appointed Chief Mine Engineer of the Maryland Bureau of Mines by Governor Albert C. Ritchie and assumed office October 1, 1922. Governor Ritchie appointed G. M. Gillette, Frostburg, representative of the coal operators, and Law-

rence Dunn, Midland, representative of the miners, in December, 1922, as members of the State Mine Examining Board. Mr. Gillette is the General Manager of the Maryland Division of The Consolidation Coal Company, Frostburg, Allegany County, and Mr. Dunn is a miner employed in the Jackson Mine of the Georges Creek Coal Mining Company, Lonaconing, but resides at Midland, Allegany County. Under the new mining law the Chief Mine Engineer is Chairman, ex officio, of the State Mine Examining Board.

The State Mine Examining Board held the first examination for Mine Foremen, Assistant Mine Foremen and Fire Bosses at Frostburg, January 23-27, 1923. One hundred and eighty-seven candidates presented themselves as candidates for examination and sixteen Certificates of Competency of the First Class, fifteen Certificates of Competency of the Second Class, seventy-five Mine Foremen Service Certificates, thirty-five Assistant Mine Foremen Service Certificates, two Fire Boss Service Certificates and one Mine Foreman Service Certificate of the First Class were issued.

In accordance with the new Mining Law, the State Employment Commission held an examination for District Mine Inspectors and recommended Frank T. Powers of Frostburg, John B. Watkins of Kempton and Thomas Richardson of Frostburg. Frank T. Powers and John B. Watkins were recommended to the Governor for appointment by the Chief Mine Engineer and were appointed District Mine Inspectors by Governor Ritchie and assumed office May 1, 1923.

### LABOR CONDITIONS

A strike of coal mine employes in the Western Maryland coal field was called on April 1, 1922, by the officials of the miners organization. There was a very general cessation of mining operations for several months following the calling of the strike and after being idle some time a few mines resumed operation, after signing an agreement with the miners organization. Mining operations were gradually resumed in many other mines during the early part of 1923, under an open shop plan of operation, and by late summer there was a general resumption of coal mining, most of the mines operating under open shop conditions. The strike was officially called off by the miners' officials on November 22, 1923.

On September 18, 1922, Mr. Charles Swick, a miner employed by the Allegany Coal Company, in Tacoma Mine No. 1, near Westernport, Md., was fatally injured by an explosion of black powder. He was taken to the Hoffman Hospital, Keyser, W. Va., where he died three days later.

Mr. Swick stated before he died that he was making a cartridge of black powder with his lamp on his cap and the charge exploded. No one was working with him at the time of the accident and he was six hundred feet from his place when found by the Mine Foreman, Mr. R. C. Roberts.

Mr. Bailey was driving a cross-cut in No. 4 room, in Third Left Heading for air and was drilling a hole in the left corner of the coal face which had just been cut by the machine about five feet, when a large oval shaped piece of rock fell on him, crushing the breast plate of his drill into his stomach and causing injuries which later resulted in death.

The rock was saucer-shaped and measured seven feet in diameter, starting from the rib, and came to about one foot thickness in the center. The last prop from face was five and one-half feet. There were seven unused six-foot props in his place and he had his place well timbered. The accident appeared from investigation to have been unavoidable.

Mr. Keefer just recently started to work as a miner and his inexperience probably cost him his life. I would recommend that temporary props be set under this rock. If this had been done in the present case, this accident probably would not have happened.

They had taken several large slabs and Mr. Spurling was arranging to set a prop under the piece that was left up, thinking it would hold, but it fell before he could get the prop in place, catching him beneath it and injuring him internally, from which he died. The cap pieces were setting parallel with the track; had they been set at right angles to the track it would have afforded more protection, and would in this case have almost caught the edges of the slab that fell. The dimensions of the piece of rock which fell were 9 feet long, 5 feet wide at its widest point, and 5 inches thick in center.

During the period May 1-December 31, 1922, they employed 30 men, worked 40 days and produced 2,269 tons of coal.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 19 men, worked 170 days and produced 9,487.52 tons of coal.

#### TRI-STATE CONSOLIDATED COAL COMPANY

Simon Durst ..... Mine Foreman.

Tri-State No. 1 is located near Jennings, on the Jennings Branch Railroad. It is a drift opening, working the Bakerstown or Honeycomb coal seam. Ventilation is produced by a fan driven by a steam engine, and is conducted to the working faces in a lawful manner.

During the period May 1-December 31, 1922, they employed 16 men, worked 85 days and produced 3,377 tons of coal.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 16 men, worked 75 days and produced 1,395.73 tons of coal.

#### M. & M. COAL COMPANY

##### Yoder Mine

Hugh C. McMahon ..... Mine Foreman.

Yoder Mine is located about 1 mile east of Grantsville. It is a drift opening, working the Freeport coal seam. Ventilation is by natural means.

During the period May 1-December 31, 1922, they employed 6 men, and produced 585 tons of coal.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 5 men, worked 180 days and produced 2,000 tons of coal.

## MARYLAND SMOKELESS FUEL COMPANY

Yommer Mine of the Maryland Smokeless Fuel Company is located near Jennings, on the Jennings Branch Railroad. It is a drift opening, working the Bakerstown or Honeycomb coal seam. Ventilation is produced by a fan driven by a gasoline motor.

During the period May 1-December 31, 1922, this mine was idle.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 9 men, worked 30 days and produced 409 tons of coal.

## McKANWIG COAL COMPANY

David McKinley ..... Mine Foreman.

Nethkin Mine is a drift opening in the Freeport coal seam, located  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile east of Bayard, W. Va., and developed on the double-entry system. Ventilation is produced by a fan driven by gasoline engine and conveyed to the working faces by doors and stoppings, and is found to be satisfactory.

During the period May 1-December 31, 1922, they employed 22 men, worked 156 days and produced 11,349 tons of coal.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 22 men, and produced 8,560 tons of coal.

## TABLE ROCK COAL COMPANY

George Moreland ..... Mine Foreman.

This mine is a drift opening in the Kittanning seam located 5 miles from Gorman, Md. It is a fuel mine.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 5 men and produced 1,360 tons of coal.

## LOST HOPE MINE

This mine is located near Oakland. It is a drift opening, working the Kittanning seam of coal. Ventilation is natural. It is a fuel mine.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 2 men and produced 427 tons of coal.

## A. G. SHROUT

This is an opening located 3 miles west of Oakland. Ventilation is by natural means. It is a fuel mine.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 1 man and produced 536 tons of coal.

### U. M. STANTON COAL MINES

U. M. Stanton ..... Mine Foreman.

This mine is located on the Jennings Branch Railway near Jennings. It is a drift opening, working the Honeycomb or Bakers-town coal seam.

During the period May 1-December 31, 1922, this mine employed 6 men, worked 115 days and produced 2,400 tons of coal.

### MELVIN WEIMER

Melvin Weimer ..... Mine Foreman.

This is a small mine located near Oakland, Md. It is a drift opening, working the Bakerstown coal seam. Ventilation is by natural means. This coal is mined for domestic use.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 12 men, worked 184 days and produced 1,902 tons of coal.

### GEORGE E. SLOAN FUEL MINE

Geo. E. Sloan ..... Mine Foreman.

This mine is located near McHenry, Md. It is a drift opening working the Kittanning coal seam. Ventilation is by natural means.

During the calendar year 1923, they employed 3 men, and produced 398.12 tons of coal.

## EXAMINATIONS FOR MINE FOREMEN, ASSISTANT MINE FOREMEN AND FIRE BOSSES

The first examination for mine foremen, assistant mine foremen and fire bosses, under the new mining law, was held in the Opera House at Frostburg, Allegany County, Maryland, from January 23 to 27, 1923. At this examination in accordance with the law, service certificates were issued to those mine foremen, assistant mine foremen and fire bosses who were acting as such when the law went into effect on October 1, 1922, and who did not wish to take the examination for Certificates of Competency.

A number of mine foremen, assistant mine foremen, fire bosses and miners took the written and oral examinations for Certificates of Competency. The following candidates passed and were awarded certificates of the character indicated:

### NIGHT MINING CLASSES

On September 10, 1923, under the direction of Vocational Mining Instructor L. C. Hutson, night mining classes were established at Barton, Mt. Savage and Frostburg in Allegany County, and at Dodson and Kitzmiller in Garrett County.

Classes were held at Barton on Monday evening, Kitzmiller on Tuesday evening, Dodson on Wednesday evening, Mt. Savage on Thursday evening and Frostburg on Friday evening.

The enrollment of the Barton class was 76, Dodson class 30, Kitzmiller class 37, Mt. Savage class 37, and of the Frostburg class 135, the total enrollment being 315. The work was continued throughout the remainder of the year.

All classes of mine labor were employed, ranging from miners working at the face, through trappers, drivers, electricians, foremen, assistant foremen, fire bosses to superintendents and operators.

This work is conducted under an informal agreement between the State Board of Education, the County Board of Education of Allegany County, the University of Maryland, the Maryland Bureau of Mines and the Federal Board for Vocational Education. Under this arrangement the Maryland Bureau of Mines has paid half of the instructor's salary for the first year and all of his expenses, the Federal Board for Vocational Education paying the remaining half of his salary.

Volunteer instructors gave the students instruction in arithmetic in the classes at Mt. Savage, Barton and Frostburg.

### **PROSECUTIONS**

On November 16th, 1923, four miners were fined \$3.00 each, the costs in the case, for violation of the clause in Section 148 of the Maryland Mining Law, which prohibits the shooting of coal off the solid.

### **SAFETY ORDERS**

On July 21, 1923, a Safety order was issued and served upon an operator in order to force the installment of a fan. The operator installed the fan before prosecutions were begun.

### **MINE RESCUE AND FIRST AID**

During the latter part of 1923 a Mine Rescue Station was installed at Westernport. In this Rescue Station there are six (6) Oxygen Breathing Apparatus, an Oxygen Pump with the requisite oxygen cylinders, cartridges for the breathing apparatus, fittings, etc. Instruction was given by the U. S. Bureau of Mines Rescue Car 7 both in mine rescue and first aid.
