REPORT OF THE MARYLAND BUREAU OF MINES 1940

To His Excellency,
Hon HERBERT R. O'CONOR,
Governor of Maryland.

SIR:

The report herewith submitted is for the calendar year 1940, and is the sixty-fourth annual report upon conditions of the Coal and Clay mines within the State.

The reports from the various mining operators throughout the State show the tonnage to be as follows:

CLAY AND COAL PRODUCTION

COAL PRODUCTION, ALLEGANY COUNTY

During the calendar year 1940 Allegany County employed 1,191 miners, 106 drivers, 203 inside laborers, and 120 outside employees, making a total of 1,620 men. The production of coal for the year 1940 was 993,291.06 net tons. This shows a production of 834 net tons for each miner employed during this period.

COAL PRODUCTION, GARRETT COUNTY

During the calendar year 1940 Garrett County employed 728 miners, 107 drivers, 91 inside laborers and 103 outside employees, making a total of 1,029 men. The production of coal for the year 1940 was 543,869.09 net tons. This shows a production of 747 net tons for each miner employed during this period.

FIRE CLAY PRODUCTION

During the calendar year 1940 the fire clay mines in Allegany County employed 95 miners, 9 drivers, 17 inside laborers and 27 outside employees, making a total of 148 men. The production of clay during the calendar year 1940 was 79,587.02 net tons.

TONNAGE PER FATALITY (BY COUNTY)

One fatal accident occurred in Allegany County during the calendar year 1940, making 993,291.06 net tons of coal produced for each fatality; number of fatalities per 1,000 employees .617; number of fatalities per 1,000,000 net tons of coal produced 1.006.

One fatal accident occurred in Garrett County during the calendar year 1940, making 543,869.09 net tons of coal produced for each fatality; number of fatalities per 1,000 employes .971; number of fatalities per 1,000,000 net tons of coal produced 1.838.

TONNAGE PER FATALITY FOR ENTIRE STATE

During the calendar year 1940 there were 768,580 net tons of coal produced for each accident; fatalities per 1,000 employes .755; number of fatalities per 1,000,000 tons of coal produced 1.301.

WEIGHMASTER LICENSES FOR THOSE WEIGHING SOLID FUEL

During the year 1940, in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 349 Maryland Laws (1937) the Bureau continued to inspect the weigh scales of all those engaged in weighing solid fuel in the State of Maryland, outside the City of Baltimore, 217 truck scales being tested and 16 were retested.

From the inception of the work under this Law, November 23, 1937 up to and including December, 1940, 1,438 weighmaster licenses were issued by the Bureau, the fee for each license being \$10.00, and this money was turned over to the State Treasurer.

From January, 1940, to December, 1940 inclusive, 428 weighmaster licenses were issued.

COAL TRANSPORTED BY THE RAILROADS TRAVERSING THE WESTERN MARYLAND COAL FIELD CALENDAR YEAR 1940

The coal shipments over the Cumberland & Pennsylvania Railroad, which traverses the center of the George's Creek coal field, amounted to 563,782 net tons.

There were 507,665 net tons of coal produced by mines located on the Western Maryland Railway in the State of Maryland during 1940. Of this total, 144,530 net tons originated in the George's Creek District.

For the same period mines located on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad in Maryland made coal shipments amounting to 97,885 net tons.

BALTIMORE'S EXPORT COAL BUSINESS IN 1940

Through the courtesy of the Export and Import Bureau, Baltimore Association of Commerce, we are able to give the following information:

During the calendar year 1940, there were 145,029 long tons of coal exported from the Port of Baltimore. This was a slight decrease in tonnage from 1939 exports of 200,807 long tons, but well ahead of 1938 exports of 40,727 tons and 1937 exports of 59,888 tons.

There were eleven countries receiving Baltimore's export coal during the year 1940, with Chile in first place, having taken 36,527 tons on 4 vessels. Argentina dropped from first place in 1939 to second place in 1940, receiving a total of 32,503 tons on 6 vessels, with Italy ranking as the Port's third best coal customer during the year, having taken 16,581 tons on 2 vessels; Sweden was next in line with 12,420 tons of Baltimore's exported coal. The remaining 46,998 tons of coal were shipped to Bolivia, Brazil, British Columbia, Cuba, Norway, Portugal, and Switzerland. In all, 26 vessels were used in the coal export trade from Baltimore during the year.

During the first four months of 1941, 11,820 tons of coal have been exported from the Port on 4 vessels to Brazil and Cuba.

Bunker coal supplied to vessels operating in the foreign trade from the Port of Baltimore in 1940 amounted to 104,520 tons. This compared with 117,106 tons in 1939; 97,849 tons in 1938 and 133,103 tons during 1937.

TRADE CONDITIONS

During the calendar year 1940 the larger mines, in general, operated fairly continuously but the smaller mines, that is, those employing from eight to ten men, operated quite intermittently. These mines depend upon the demand for domestic coal.

Two of the larger mines in Garrett County were idle during a goodly portion of the year and this caused a material reduction in the coal output in that County. However, there was an increase in the production in Alleghany County to the extent that there was an increase of 69,310 net tons for the entire State.

There was strong competition from oil, natural gas and hydroelectric plants. An increasing amount of coal was supplied to the large manufacturing plants in Cumberland vicinity.

LABOR CONDITIONS

There was no material stoppage of mining operations in the mines during the calendar year 1940. There was an increasing number of small mines opened during the year but these as a rule operated only during the fall and winter months.

Towards the close of the year there was an increased demand for coal and miners were in demand.

While applying mine car brakes, right hand missed brake handle and struck side of car. Resulting in injury to right wrist.								
Man states that a lump of coal fell down his hoot and a larger lump fell from the roof, striking the left ankle and mashing the lump of coal in the boot. Infected left ankle, with an ulcer about the size of a fifty-cent piece.								
Man states that on March 26, 1940, a coupling pin flew up and struck finger and he kept on working and today he struck it on his dinner bucket. Infected right, fifth finger and pus draining from the finger nail. X-Ray shows old fracture to tip of right little finger.								
Bruised over both shoulders and back caused by roof rock falling and mashing him to pavement. Dislocated right, fifth finger. Sprained left ankle and left leg. Particle of sand blown off locomotive wheel, lodged in left eye. Foreign body lodged in left eye.								
Rock fell from roof and struck man on back and mashed him to the ground. Bruised back and chest. Bruised right arm. Sprained right ankle and leg. Dust and smoke in mines after shot caused burns about face. First and second degree burn scattered over entire face due to the burning of dust and smoke. Man stamping with pick and rock flew up and struck right eye. Foreign body was lodging lump of coal in car, the lump broke and one piece fell on his fifth left finger. Tip of fifth left finger crushed. Nail torn about off. Mining car ran up on skid and caught 2nd left finger. Distal end of 2nd left finger crushed.								
Top bone fell from face of coal and struck right foot. Mashed and bruised right toe. 4th and 5th toes, with fracture to distal phalanx of both toes.								
Drill bar kicked back and struck right hand. Sprained and bruised right hand, with fracture to proximal ends of second and third metacarpal bones of hand. Man pulling spike and the bar slipped and mashed second, right finger. Crushed distal end of 2nd right finger. Crushed distal phalanx of right, 2nd finger. Man pushing mining car and bumped left side of head against post. Bruised left ear and left ear drum. Deep cut in cornea.								
Man loading coal and dirt flew up and struck left eye. Scar where dirt struck eye. Was cleaning up after trolley fire and stepped on nail sticking out of board. Stab wound to bottom of left foot. Head rope for mining machine snapped in two; one of the ends striking man in left eye. Deep cut across corner of left eye, with marred conjunctivitis. Foreign body removed.								
While loading rocks onto drag, man struck right middle finger against rock. Striking steel rail when piece of rail flew up and struck right eye. Hatchet flew out of hand and struck left leg between knee and ankle. Sprained back while lifting lump of coal. Sacroiliac sprain, right side. Top bone rolled and struck both knees. Acute buritis of both knees, with marked swelling.								
Setting brake on mine car. Brake failed to lock on ratchet, kicked back and struck left middle finger. Distal end of left middle finger mashed. Knocking him down and away from rock. Bruised nose, forehead and left eye. Two small cuts in back of head. Sprained back and right chest. Few small cuts on back.								
Man mixing cement and some flew up in left eye. Marked conjunctivitis of left eye. Attempting to set brake on mine car, slipped and fell cutting face and head. Cut on top of head, cut on right eye, and bruised over left eye.								
Holding stringer or cable end on trolley wire which caused a flash that injured eye. While operating locomotive (supposedly pushing mine car with locomotive) empty car struck crossbar or support causing bar to fall, striking man on back and side. Bruised and strained back and left side. While knocking sulphur off piece of coal, pick handle struck another piece of coal causing pick to strike left thumb. Crushed tip of left thumb, with fracture to distal phalanx of left thumb. Headlight wire of motor shorted against frame of motor and burned left thigh and left leg. Got sulphur water in his right eye. Conjunctivitis and Keratitis of right eye.



On April 1st, 1940, between 3:00 and 5:00 P. M., Daniel A. Schell, operating a small mine near Gorman, Md., known as S. E. S. Coal Company, working the Freeport coal seam, was fatally injured due to suffocation when caught under a fall at the pit mouth.

Time of Accident—April 1, 1940, between 3:00 and 5:00 P. M.

Date of Death—April 1, 1940.

Name of injured—Daniel A. Schell.

Nationality—American.

Age—55 years.

Married or single—Married.

Dependents—Wife and 3 children.

Residence—Gorman, Md.

Inspector in charge of district—Clyde J. Rowe, who made inspection after accident.

Recommendation—Men should not work alone.

FATAL ACCIDENTS**CALENDAR YEAR 1940**

There were two fatal accidents during the year, both due to falls of roof. Neither one of these accidents should have occurred if ordinary care had been exercised.

The first accident, of which Jess Reed was the victim, occurred on February 1, 1940, about 10:00 A. M. Mr. Reed was almost instantly killed by a fall of rock. He was working with Mr. Perry Keister and they had just finished loading their second car of coal out of the room-neck and had set a prop under that part of the rock which fell. Mr. Reed had set a prop on the lower side of the place and Mr. Keister had set one on the upper side and apparently they thought they had the roof caught. However, the rock fell, leaving part of the cap-piece about 8 inches in length standing as it had been set. The rock was top heavy and fell over the prop and cap.

The mine was being operated by Russell Keister Coal Company under sub-lease from the Midlothian Coal Company. Mr. Russell Keister was the foreman and superintendent and was in charge of the shift. Mr. Keister had visited the working place on February 1, at about 9:50 A. M. and the accident is said to have occurred about 10:00 A. M. Mr. Keister reported that he looked at the roof and told the men it was in bad condition. The deceased was timbering and he told Mr. Keister that he thought he had the roof caught and Mr. Keister stated that he thought the deceased had caught the roof.

The deceased had worked in mines about thirty years. Mr. Keister said that he told the men to be very careful and to keep the place well timbered. He had gone about 70 feet from the working place when the accident happened. It was said that to the best of their knowledge the deceased man's body was covered with the rock from the lower part of the chest upward.

In the investigation held by the Inspector it developed that the slab type of cap pieces were being used. The mine had been idle for some time and these cap pieces were not as substantial as new cap pieces would have been. There were two props under the rock that had been set. From the size of the pieces it is evident that ordinary good timbering should have supported this rock, at least for a time. The roof hung out over the heading somewhat on the side where Mr. Reed was working. The props that were set under the rock were not dislodged by the fall but two props set on the heading were dislodged. The coal is approximately 30 inches in thickness, and the height on the heading about 52 inches.

A driver was on the heading getting ready to take the load away when the accident happened. There was some discussion at the investigation as to the quality of the cap pieces used. The Inspector had been trying to introduce sawed cap pieces instead of the slab cap pieces.

Daniel A. Schell was killed by a fall of roof in a small mine at Gorman, Garrett County. This mine was opened in the Freeport seam at the base of a hill and a plane had been made to the roadway about one-eighth of a mile from the mine opening. An automobile engine had been placed at the top of the incline to haul the coal from the mine up to the roadside where it was used for domestic purposes.

Mr. Schell was a competent, practical miner. He was working by himself and was endeavoring to clean up a fall of roof which had occurred at about 15 feet inside the mouth of the mine. The accident occurred somewhere between 3:00 P. M. and 5:00 P. M. His son went to the mine to ascertain why he had not returned for supper. The son noticed the fall of roof and a partially loaded car of dirt and mud but could not see or hear anything of his father. He called but received no answer. He thought his father might be in back of the fall. He then went up close to the fall and called but again received no answer. Then the son noticed some hair sticking out of the mud and dirt in the fall and he thought this might be the dog, which was at all times with his father. The son then felt sure that his father was under the fall as the dog had always accompanied him. The son went out on the hillside and called his brother-in-law who was at one of the houses just above the mine. The brother-in-law, Maynard Evans, came down to the mouth of the mine and together with the younger Schell started moving some dirt away and discovered that what the son thought had been the dog was his father's head. Then some of the people from the houses on the hillside came down with shovels and picks and started to get the body of Mr. Schell out.

Apparently Mr. Schell had been trying to place some lagging over the crossbars to prevent additional dirt and clay from falling or sliding into the drift mouth. Evidently he had been using a steel bar to move a stone to make a place for his lagging as the steel bar was found at his right hand. Some dirt apparently had fallen or slipped down and caught his legs as that was the only place where he was fastened. He was caught also by one of the cross-bars just above the calves of his legs. This cross-bar must have been dislodged by a slight fall of dirt. The dirt and mud then covered him over except the top of his head which was in view. The doctor who examined the body reported there was no broken bones nor a sign of a wound and in all probability he had died from suffocation, but there was no sign of a struggle or of an attempt to free himself and since there was such a small amount of dirt over his head he must have been knocked totally or partially unconscious as he could have freed himself with very little effort. Had there been someone with him and had he not been working alone his life might have been saved.

CONCLUSION

While the enrollment of this year as compared to last year, showed a slight decrease, the average weekly attendance showed a gain over that of last year.

At the beginning of the School Year prospects for a better than average enrollment and attendance were brighter than they had been for some years, due to the increased activity of the mining operations at that time, and other favorable conditions.

But as the school year progressed, the coal industry slumped to a new low at some points, and the weather conditions became increasingly adverse.

While the Instructor was able to reach his meeting points, with one or two exceptions, thus maintain his schedule, the weather was so severe at times that the attendance was reduced materially. At some points, on some occasions, it was almost impossible to maintain a comfortable temperature in the class room for the duration of the class.

In spite of these handicaps, which were serious, interest was maintained at a high level, and some of the individual work done was the best that has come to the attention of the Instructor since the inception of the Night Classes.

CONCLUSION

Of the total enrollment, thirty-five were new men. This number was 40% of the total number enrolled. There was a slight decrease in both enrollment and attendance, as compared to last year. This was due to the fact that there was a greater amount of mining activity, due to mining conditions, on the second and third shift. This set up practically eliminated the men, who worked on these shifts, from attending any mining classes.

The winter was extremely severe, and as a great number of the students reside on side roads, this made traveling very difficult as these roads were blocked, in some cases, for several weeks. This condition rendered it practically impossible to get out to attend classes.

The classes were very much appreciated by the students who were able to attend and the work performed, on the average, was of a very high quality.

The Seventeenth annual Short Course in Coal Mining, held at Kitzmiller, Maryland, conducted by the Maryland Bureau of Mines, in co-operation with the University of Maryland, the State Department of Education and the County Boards of Education of Allegany and Garrett Counties, opened June 17, 1940, and closed July 27, 1940.

CONCLUSION

The average age of the students was 33.6 years. The average daily attendance was thirteen. Seven were part time students, while fourteen were full time. Five men were enrolled from Allegany County, sixteen from Garrett County.

Reviews and tests put on with the cooperation of the District Mine Inspectors, were held weekly, with a view of making the Course as intensive as possible.

Some new methods and equipment were tried with very satisfactory results.
