 3 MR. BING: Okay, we're going to get started.
 4 Good evening, everyone. My name is Andrew Bing and I'll
 5 be the facilitator for tonight's public hearing. A few
 6 quick announcements, this hearing is for the demolition
 7 of the remaining Francis Scott Key Bridge structures.
 8 The rebuild of the replacement bridge will be reviewed
 9 under a separate Title Wetlands License Number and Water
 10 Qualification Certification Number.
 11 Comments related to bridge replacement will
 12 need to be made during the Public Notice Period or the
 13 Public Hearing associated with the rebuild. That public
 14 hearing is scheduled for September 17, 2024. If you
 15 would like to comment for the rebuild of a new bridge,
 16 please submit your comments during the Public Notice
 17 Period or at the September 17th Hearing so the department
 18 can properly review your comments.
 19 Just so everyone knows, the restrooms are
 20 directly out through that back door there. You'll see a
 21 sign that says restrooms.

1 And we do have colleagues from the American
 2 Sign Language who will be signing interpretation upfront
 3 here.
 4 Please make sure you have signed in tonight.
 5 This will make sure that everyone is provided updates as
 6 this process moves forward. And if you would like to
 7 sign up to provide a public comment, you need to let the
 8 person at the sign-up table know.
 9 This hearing is being live-streamed and
 10 recorded. If you are here for informational purposes and
 11 do not wish to comment, or you are unable to stay for the
 12 entire hearing, you have the opportunity to view the
 13 livestream of this video from home or watch the recording
 14 at a later time. The comment sheets located at the front
 15 desk has information to locate the livestream and
 16 recording of this hearing.
 17 We will start with a welcome and some
 18 introductory comments by the Maryland Department of the
 19 Environment. We will then have a brief presentation from
 20 the Applicant, the Maryland Transportation Authority.
 21 And finally, I will review the ground rules for this

 2 comments.
 3 I would now like to introduce Tammy Roberson,
 4 Deputy Program Manager Wetlands and Waterways Protection
 5 Program of the Maryland Department of the Environment.
 6 MS. ROBERSON: All right, thank you. Good
 7 evening. Again, my name is Tammy Roberson and I am the
 8 Deputy Program Manager of the Wetlands and Waterways
 9 Protection Program within the Watering Science
 10 Administration at the Maryland Department of the
 11 Environment. I will be the Hearing Officer for tonight's
 12 public informational hearing. Also, in attendance from
 13 the Department are Heather Hepburn from Tidal Wetlands
 14 Western Region Chief and Matt Wallach, Title Wetlands
 15 Division Project Manager. I would like to welcome
 16 everyone here this evening and thank the Baltimore County
 17 Public Library North Point Branch for the use of their
 18 facility tonight.
 19 At this time, I would like to acknowledge any
 20 elected officials who may be present here this evening.
 21 If you are an elected official, or representing an

 2 recognized.
 3 MR. LONG: Yes, hi. I'm Delegate Bob Long.
 4 I'm incognito today. I'm a State Legislator and this is
 5 my -- our district down here, that's why I'm down here to
 6 find out what's going on.
 7 MS. CROUCH: Hi, good evening, everyone. My
 8 name is Erica Crouch, I'm here tonight on behalf of
 9 County Executive Johnny Olszewski, Jr. I am with his
 10 Office of Community Engagement as the Outreach
 11 Coordinator for this area. Thank you.
 12 UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: Representing Director
 13 Rashad Singletary, Director of Neighborhoods for
 14 Baltimore City.
 15 MS. PETERSON-MOORE: Okay. Good evening,
 16 everyone I'm Dana Peterson Moore, I am here on behalf of
 17 Mayor Brandon Scott, Baltimore City.
 18 HEARING OFFICER ROBERSON: Thank you for
 19 attending this hearing, and we will be hearing your
 20 testimony shortly if you do plan to speak. If there is
 21 anyone who has not signed the attendance sheets please do

1 so before you leave tonight. These sheets will be used
 2 to notify you of MDE's final decision and provide you
 3 with a copy of the hearing report and will be also used
 4 to identify those of you who wish to make a statement at
 5 tonight's hearing. Those statements will be heard at the
 6 conclusion of the applicant's presentation. The
 7 attendance sheets will also be provided to the Board of
 8 Public Works for use in its review process. As a
 9 courtesy, please turn off all communication devices, or
 10 place them in silent mode.

11 We are conducting a public informational
 12 hearing pursuant to Subsection 5-204 of the Environmental
 13 Article Code of Maryland Regulations. The purpose of
 14 this public informational hearing is for the applicant to
 15 present the proposed project and Tidal Wetlands impact
 16 that may be associated with the proposed activity as well
 17 as any impact to water quality. In addition, the hearing
 18 provides the Department with an opportunity to solicit
 19 additional information from interested persons. This
 20 hearing is not a contested case hearing under Maryland's
 21 Administrative Procedure Act. It is a public hearing for

1 water quality certification.

2 While I want to stress the fact that we are
 3 here to share information, we will have some structure to
 4 the hearing in terms of the order and length of the
 5 various presentations. Please be advised that it is not
 6 necessary to read a statement to make it part of the
 7 official record. Written comments will also be accepted
 8 and receive the same consideration as any oral
 9 statements. In fact, for accuracy, if you have written
 10 comments to read into the record, please provide a copy
 11 of those comments before you leave. This hearing is
 12 being recorded.

13 The statutory authority for issuance of a Tidal
 14 Wetlands License is Title 16 of the Environment Article
 15 Annotated Code of Maryland as implemented under COMAR
 16 Section, 23.02.04 and Subtitle 26.24. A State Tidal
 17 Wetlands License, is issued by the Board of Public Works,
 18 consisting of the Governor, State Treasurer, and
 19 Comptroller of the State of Maryland, based upon a report
 20 and recommendation submitted to the Board by the
 21 Department. In accordance with the Maryland

1 Constitution, the Board is the sole body with authority
 2 over State Property, including State Tidal Wetlands.

3 In its proprietary authority, the Board has the
 4 right to grant a third party a license to construct or
 5 conduct an activity in State Tidal Wetlands. According
 6 to Section 16-202 of the Environment Article, the
 7 Secretary of the Department shall assist the Board in
 8 determining whether to issue a license to dredge or fill
 9 State Wetlands. The Secretary shall submit a report
 10 indicating whether the license should be granted,
 11 including any recommended terms, conditions, and
 12 consideration after consultation with applicable federal,
 13 state, and local entities. Issuance of sufficient public
 14 notice and conducting any requested hearing,
 15 consideration of any public comments received, and
 16 consideration of any other information the Secretary
 17 thinks advisable. In making its decision, the Board is
 18 guided by the public policy of the state, considering
 19 applicable ecological, economic, developmental,
 20 recreational, and esthetic values to preserve Tidal
 21 Wetlands and prevent their destruction.

1 I will now read briefly from the regulations so
 2 that it is clear how we are going to proceed.

3 An applicant and any interested person shall be
 4 given an opportunity at the Informational Hearing to
 5 present facts and make statements supporting or opposing
 6 the license. The hearing is not a contested case hearing
 7 under Maryland's Administrative Procedure Act. The order
 8 of the presentation is determined by the Hearing Officer
 9 and may be conducted as follows: introduction of the
 10 activity and participants by the Hearing Officer;
 11 presentation of the proposed project by the applicant;
 12 statements by public officials; statements by the public;
 13 and then closing the public informational hearing by the
 14 Hearing Officer.

15 The Hearing Officer has the authority and duty
 16 to conduct a full and fair Public Informational Hearing
 17 Act to avoid unnecessary delay and to maintain order;
 18 regulate the course of the hearing and the conduct of the
 19 participants; extend the time period for providing
 20 supplemental written comments or information for
 21 inclusion in the hearing record; and rule upon a request

It is also</p> <p>5 the responsibility of my office to evaluate requests for</p> <p>6 water quality certification. 1 The Maryland Transportation Authority has identified the
 2 demolition of the remaining portion of the bridge, along
 3 with some preliminary engineering studies, as critical
 4 path items leading to the rebuild of the Key Bridge and
 5 we have submitted permit applications to authorize
 6 impacts associated with those activities.

7 Next slide. So, demolition and preliminary
 8 engineering studies have been split into two phases for
 9 the permitting purposes. The first phase, which received
 10 emergency authorization from MDE, includes the demolition
 11 activities shown in green on the slide. The elements
 12 include mechanical removal of the parapets and median
 13 barrier along with the roadway deck over water and land,
 14 mechanical removal of the girders and frame, steel
 15 framing over the water and removal of the girder spans
 16 and piers on land, using explosives to demolish them and
 17 drop them down to the ground.

18 Next slide. The first phase also includes
 19 preliminary engineering studies, requiring authorization,
 20 and that includes soil borings for sampling the materials
 21 in the river, pile installation for pile load tests,

1 possible drilled shaft tests, and static load tests for
 2 those foundation elements. And that'll be work conducted
 3 from barges and temporary work platforms, as you see here
 4 on these sketches. This phase also includes the
 5 installation of some temporary piling that may be needed
 6 to position those barges in place for these operations.

7 The second phase of the demolition includes
 8 removal of the remaining piers in the water, as well as
 9 the dolphin systems that are adjacent to the bridge piers
 10 as you see here in this slide. The red hatching just
 11 shows the limits of that removal. We will be taking the
 12 piers down to two feet below the mud line in the river,
 13 and we are working with the agencies to permit this
 14 through explosive demolition. That will allow the
 15 material to drop down to the river bottom, at which point
 16 we will remove the material using clamshell-type buckets
 17 to remove that off the river bottom to reduce our
 18 impacts. MDTA is committed to rebuilding the Key Bridge
 19 as quickly as possible, while we're minimizing impacts to
 20 the aquatic resources.

21 MR. BING: Thank you, Brian. So, we're going

1 to start public testimony briefly. I'm just going to go
 2 over some ground rules right now. The purpose of this
 3 public hearing is to allow interested parties to provide
 4 public comments related to the demolition of the stable-
 5 standing structures comprising the remaining Francis
 6 Scott Key Bridge. My role as the Hearing Facilitator is
 7 to run a professional and orderly public hearing. I
 8 understand how important these issues are, and I take my
 9 role as Hearing Facilitator seriously. I'm committed to
 10 providing members of the public an opportunity to provide
 11 comments in an organized, fair, professional, and orderly
 12 manner.

13 We look forward to hearing your perspectives,
 14 but please be courteous of all speakers and understand
 15 that offensive or profane language will not be allowed.
 16 We are interested in hearing comments related to the
 17 demolition of the stable standing structures comprising
 18 the remaining Francis Scott Key Bridge from all
 19 interested individuals. Again, neither nor the panelists
 20 will respond to any questions or comments -- we are here
 21 to listen.

1 Please remember that we are recording this
 2 hearing, so speak directly and clearly into the
 3 microphone and provide your full name, address, and any
 4 organization you may be representing. To ensure all will
 5 be heard, there will be a three-minute time limit for

 13 represent the 6th Legislative District, which is this
 14 district down here. I'm here today concerned just to see
 15 what we can do to help facilitate this process to go
 16 through as smoothly and fast as possible. With the Key
 17 Bridge collapsing, it has been put a lot of stress on a
 18 lot of people down here. It was a main artery for us
 19 down here. The only question I have -- I have a couple
 20 of questions. Luckily, your staff answered a lot of my
 21 questions. So, you're following a state joint wetland --

1 MR. BING: Delegate Long, as you're starting,
 2 I'll give you -- we're not going to be able to respond to
 3 any questions right now.
 4 MR. LONG: Okay.
 5 MR. BING: So, you can ask a question, but
 6 we're not going to be in a position to respond.
 7 MR. LONG: Well, I don't have any questions,
 8 but I just want to let people know that I'm here, that
 9 I'm concerned. We want to make sure that this is done in
 10 a timely manner as possible. Anything we can do, please
 11 let us know. Thank you.
 12 MR. BING: Thank you. Any of the other elected
 13 officials or representing elected officials that would
 14 like to make comments at this time? Okay, we're going to
 15 move on to the -- Oh.
 16 MR. METZGAR: I'm a short guy.
 17 MR. BING: There you go. If you could just
 18 introduce yourself.
 19 MR. METZGAR: Sure.
 20 MR. BING: I assume you're elected official.
 21 MR. METZGAR: Yes.

1 MR. BING: Sorry, that I don't recognize you,
 2 but go ahead and state your name, and who you represent.
 3 MR. METZGAR: Once you see me, you never
 4 forget. State Delegate Rick Metzgar, District 6. I'm
 5 here in support. I'm here to see that we follow the law,
 6 be as transparent, do everything above board, and make it
 7 as is, just as clean as possible. Our Chesapeake Bay is
 8 very vital to us, and we need to make sure we take care
 9 of that. And whatever I can do to assist -- Delegate

 11 MR. BING: Okay, thank you Delegate. Again,
 12 any other elected official? Oh, go ahead. Sorry.

 14 Sailing. J-O-H-N-N-Y R-A-Y S-A-I-L-I-N-G. Thank you.
 15 MR. BING: Representing which?
 16 MR. SAILING: I represent the 6th District of
 17 Baltimore County, right here. I represent this area.
 18 MR. BING: All right. Can we lift that up a
 19 little bit.
 20 MR. SAILING: Thank you. Ditto to what the
 21 delegates have said. But more importantly, you know, the

1 people are here for a very good reason. They want all
 2 the information that is given. They want it all. We
 3 need it all. We want to make sure that they have a
 4 voice. It's important to let them have the voice. I'm
 5 their Senator, but these are my constituents, and it's
 6 really important for them to have a voice and be a
 7 participant as a part of this.
 8 From the start, we've worked with our
 9 Transportation Department, the state, the governor, and
 10 all others in our federal and our state and our local
 11 partners, but we want to work with you too. And if
 12 anything that we can do as a Senator and as Delegates and
 13 as constituents, we have Wise people here from Turner
 14 Station, from all over Wise Avenue right here, Albert,
 15 all over Dundalk and Essex, and they're really good
 16 people, and they know the area very well. So, I believe
 17 having that as a benefit for you is a benefit for us all.
 18 I want to thank you for this time. God bless.
 19 MR. BING: Thank you, Senator. Okay, any other
 20 elected officials? Okay, I'm not seeing anyone, so we're
 21 going to move on to --

1 MS. PETERSON-MOORE: I've been encouraged to
 2 just speak. I just wanted to reintroduce myself. I'm
 3 Dana Peterson Moore here on behalf of Mayor Brandon Scott
 4 from Baltimore City. Just wanted to just put on the
 5 record that, you know, obviously we're very supportive of
 6 this process. Really encouraged that there is so many
 7 people here that want to hear about the plans and what's
 8 happening. The one concern that I would just lift up and
 9 I know that you're already aware and mindful of it, are
 10 the assets that are in the port that need to be
 11 protected, which is certainly a very large water pipe
 12 that is a city asset, and then there's also a BG&E asset
 13 that needs to be protected through the demolition
 14 process. And we know that you're aware of that, and will
 15 be very, very mindful of that as the process moves
 16 forward. And as the process moves forward, we're just
 17 hoping that it's as expeditious as possible. We hear all
 18 the time about the burden that has been placed on this
 19 community and other communities getting into and out of
 20 and around Baltimore City. So, we're hopeful for a very
 21 swift process and a new bridge very soon. Thank you.

1 MR. BING: Okay. I don't see anyone else. So,
 2 we are going to move on again. If there's someone here,
 3 an elected official, who would like to make a comment,
 4 there'll be time at the end. But we are going to go move
 5 on to our members of the public who have signed in. I'm
 6 just going in the order in which they're being given to
 7 me.
 8 So, our first person will be Francis Seaman.
 9 We have two microphones, whichever one's more convenient.
 10 So, Mr. Seaman, if you could come up. After Mr. Seaman,
 11 will be Christopher Barnes and then Linwood Jackson. So,
 12 Mr. Seaman, as you come up to the microphone, if you
 13 could state your name, spell your name, and provide the
 14 area that where you live?
 15 MR. SEMAN: Hi, I'm Francis M. Seman, Sr., S-E-
 16 M-A-N, Sr. I live on 1315, Willow Road, Dundalk,
 17 Maryland, 21222. My concern is some of the things that's
 18 going to take place in the future. There should never be
 19 any environmental issue on the matter once everything is
 20 cleaned up, everything should go back to its natural
 21 state. And I just was informed from you that you have

1 mentioned that you're only going to go down two feet
 2 below the ground level for removing the debris. My
 3 concern is in visualization that all matter should be
 4 taken and removed so that there is any condition later on
 5 down the road or the pike, that it will not be interfered
 6 by the condition that was left from the bridge structure
 7 that is there today. And they should be able to remove
 8 the matter in less time than 10 months. They should be
 9 working on both sides at 24 hours a day and they should
 10 be using the cranes to cut the floor matter and sections
 11 and take it on barge and put it on land, like they did
 12 with the structure of the bridge itself, to have it cut
 13 up and make the job go faster. And that way, the sooner
 14 we get it done, the sooner they can start the preparation
 15 for the new bridge. And if they do it -- and two
 16 companies to propose the bridge, one on each end, and
 17 another two companies making the groundwork for the
 18 approach, we could have it done in two years time, and it
 19 could be a cable bridge. Because a cable bridge, I do
 20 believe, is much faster than the bridge structure.
 21 And I was always concerned about the structure

Page 25

1 of the bridge itself, why it was still there when we have
 2 heavy winds, and things because of the movement of the
 3 bridge. And when the bridge was first built, if I do
 4 recall, the tugboats met the bridge at the beginning of
 5 Carroll Island and escorted it all the way up into the
 6 harbor, and vice versa. It came down to do the same
 7 thing. Somehow or another, we got away from that, and
 8 the condition took place for the destruction of the
 9 bridge. And we should remove all debris from the old
 10 construction, like I say, to help and keep any conditions
 11 or hazards later on. Who knows what somebody might want
 12 to do or widen the channel or whatever?
 13 MR. BING: 30 seconds.
 14 MR. SEAMAN: Yes. And I thank you for taking
 15 care of my concerns, and we do for the new bridge -- we
 16 do need a cloverleaf in Dundalk so that the people can
 17 Dundalk and go in and out on a cloverleaf rather than go
 18 through the condition that they have to do today. God
 19 bless all and may peace be with all of you.
 20 MR. BING: Okay. Thank you. Next up, we're
 21 going to hear from Christopher Barnes. After Christopher

 2 you could state your name, spell your name, your address,
